



Bridgewater Primary School Sports Premium Impact and Spend 2020-2021

Sport Premium Grant Background

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. The purpose of the funding is that schools will have to spend the sport funding in improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this. Accountability Schools will be held to account for how they spend the sport funding.

At Bridgewater Primary School we have been allocated £11,387 with £7,996 carried on from previous year due to COVID 19, for the financial year 2020-2021. As a school we intend on using the money to develop children's and teacher's skills within the P.E curriculum.

How as a school will make these improvement sustainable

Throughout the up and coming year, we will use the money to enable further development of the children and focus on providing provision for more children to achieve working at a greater depth standard.

The DfE has made the following statement:

"The DfE understands that schools are keen to know how much funding they will receive so that they can plan for the next academic year, and are seeking to communicate high level principles in preparation for the new academic year. These will be announced in due course, however, we can confirm that all schools will see an increase in their premium allocation." "The Government is committed to ensuring that all schools are fairly funded and that money is invested in the most effective way. After careful consideration, we have therefore decided not to proceed with the proposed healthy pupils capital programme, in order to provide more money to schools through their core funding instead. Schools can, of course, choose to invest their core funding in PE and Sport."

We will ensure that these improvements are sustainable, by teacher and staff CPD regularly, including questionnaires, and mentoring during P.E lessons. We will also provide parents and children with questionnaires to further the development of the school through accessing their opinions. Furthermore, to sustain the standard and development now, we will allow parents to become more involved in P.E, such as supporting the children in competitions, house and competitions at different venues.
